CALIFORNIA CHARDONNAY

A golden age for the state's premier white is defined by expressive, cellarworthy wines

Chardonnay has been an important part of the California wine scene especially since the 1970s, when plantings of the grape took off. According to the most recent California Grape Acreage Report (2023) put out by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service, there are more than 88,000 acres planted in the Golden State, or 19% of the total wine grape acreage, second only to Cabernet Sauvignon.

Today California Chardonnay represents one of the most consistent sources for high quality, expressive, *terroir*-driven and ageable wines. But the various fashions of Chardonnay and the path this category has been on can create confusion among consumers. The Chardonnay styles of the 1990s and the cheap Chardonnays on supermarket shelves are no longer representative of the best the state has to offer. One of the most common refrains I hear from vintners is that wine lovers tell them, "I don't like Chardonnay, but I like yours."

Since the 1970s, California vintners have learned about where

the grape does well and how to farm and vinify it to get the best results. By the 1990s, California Chardonnays were known, at best, for fruit-forward, concentrated styles including tropical fruit flavors, and bold, rich wines with lavish oak and alcohol percentages that regularly topped 14%. At worst, they were overoaked, high-alcohol concoctions with notes of butter, toasted marshmallow and spice that overwhelmed the fruit within. A backlash against the grape was called the ABC movement, "Anything But Chardonnay."

EDITOR'S TIP

The best Chardonnays from the Golden State age beautifully. Consider purchasing a handful of your favorite wines and cellar them to revisit periodically as they evolve, with more savory notes and additional expressions of vintage variations.

By the 2000s and 2010s, a shift occurred, with more California producers reassessing their approaches and moving toward fresher, more restrained styles, largely driven by a broader interest in *terroir*.


expression, sustainability and finesse in winemaking.

Today California Chardonnay encompasses a significant diversity of styles, ranging from the full-bodied, rich wines that have long been associated with the state to purer, more energetic versions that emphasize clarity and site. But here's what is remarkable; even the bolder Chardonnays today typically show more brightness and juicy qualities, as they evolved to reflect their own takes on current trends.

Winemakers openly discuss doing less in the cellar to allow the fruit and *terroir* to shine through more transparently. They emphasize the importance of precision, subtlety and avoiding overintervention—often reducing oak influence (including less oak use, larger oak containers and lower new oak percentages) and focusing on the intrinsic characteristics of the vineyard sites. Chardonnay has been known as “the winemaker's grape” for how much it can transmit the winemaking choices, but these days, less is definitely more.

The move toward fresher styles means certain cool-climate regions stand out, such as Sonoma Coast, Santa Barbara County and pockets along the Central Coast. Winemakers are increasingly turning to specific, high quality vineyard sites that reflect the diversity of California's varied *terroirs*. Regional blends are also stronger than ever, as winemakers tap into what makes each corner of the Golden State special. There is also more attention to clones—especially heritage clones—that have been propagated for freshness and intensity.

With winemakers paying careful attention to vineyard management, precise cellar work and a focus on the purity of the fruit, California Chardonnay is a compelling category now in a golden age.
